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Editorial Comment Village life goes on - but for how much longer?

The same familiar and enjoyable activities happen year on year: new projects are proposed and brought to fruition - often by a small group - bringing welcome improvements to lives. The Parish Clerk reports that road safety measures are well underway; plans for the defibrillator and information point at the Red Phone Box are confirmed; school results are good or improving; the new refuse collection system is working; there is positive action being taken by the Police in the face of the current spate of burglaries and the two Parish Council places have been filled.

Further afield, there will be a new, accessible Records Office in Ipswich to the delight of those interested in our history; in Suffolk we are better than most places at controlling measles though good vaccination rates and almost a million un-safe goods have been apprehended at Felixtowe Port.

The village is having a very busy time socially with the many events that have happened and are in the pipeline for which many thanks are due to the Social Club Committee and Church volunteers. We appear to care greatly for our immediate environment, looking after our surroundings with twice-yearly litter picks and a churchyard tidy. A big thank-you for Bosch for donating gardening equipment to help with this.

So it is hard to take on board, when we look round our well-ordered and cared-for village, that much could be amiss and that we are not all working towards a better future. However, the small voice of a 15 year-old - Greta Thunberg - in Sweden quietly pointed out that all was not right with the world and that her future seemed anything but rosy.

With tropical forests ablaze, abnormal droughts and hurricanes causing devastation and glaciers and icecaps melting because of what we consume, the next generation fears their world is becoming uninhabitable and are worried enough to call the recent Global Climate Strikes which have been supported by tens of thousands of people. Governments and local Councils here are declaring a Climate Emergency.

So we have to change how we do things. Unfortunately the number of doubters is still uncomfortably high as a recent study from King's College London discovered: https://www.kcl.ac.uk/news/britons-hugely-

underestimate-how-hot-planet-has-become-and-how-much-plastic-waste-is-in-the-environment

Fortunately there is a lot we can all do to turn things around - as long as we don't carry on thinking it is someone else's problem.

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CREETING ST MARY PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

New Parish Councillors

Welcome to our two new Councillors! Lesley Plummer of All Saints Road and Chris Emmins of Fen Lane have joined the Parish Council. All the Parish Councillor's contact details as well as the Clerk's is on the website and noticeboards.

Traffic Calming through the village

We are still awaiting the road markings 'Slow' and 'Pedestrians in Road' on All Saints Road to help villagers and parents walking their children to and from school. There was a wait of 8-10 weeks.

Vehicle Activated Speed Sign

Due to technical problems this is being sent back and will be replaced with a solar panel sign to be placed at the Jacks Green Road location whilst the development works on All Saints Road are being carried out. The post will be reinstalled at the All Saints Road location in due course.

Plans are ongoing to install a defibrillator into the telephone box as well as it being an information point for walkers.

Verges in the Village

The Parish Council are aware how bad the verges are looking in parts of the village. Due to cutbacks at the County Council, the Parish Council are seeking quotes from contractors to regularly cut back the verges/pathways, especially the path up the hill towards the church and the path on St Mary's Road from St Mary's Gardens to the entrance of Alder Carr Farm.

County Councillor's Report

Schools in Suffolk . there has been an improvement in results across a range of subjects at GCSE level – Self- reported results from Suffolk schools, released on 22 August, indicate a 4% increase in pupils achieving at least a grade 5 in all elements of the English Baccalaureate (Ebacc) and a 7% increase in the number of students achieving a grade 4, when compared with the previous year. The English Baccalaureate constitutes GSCEs in English and Maths plus GCSEs from the Sciences, Humanities and Languages. This is seen by the government as an important academic foundation for all pupils. The self-reported figures also show an increase in the number of disadvantaged pupils achieving grade 4 in English and Maths. There has also been a 2-point increase in the attainment 8 figure for disadvantage pupils, which is likely to see disadvantaged students exceed the national average when provisional results are released in October. Attainment 8 takes into account a pupil's overall results across a range of GCSEs. More than 6,500 pupils in Suffolk were entered for GCSE exams. Some schools have done particularly well: Debenham High School reported 71% of pupils achieving a grade 5 in English and Maths and 80% achieving a grade 4 in English and Maths. Debenham High School and Thomas Mills High School have reported the highest percentage of pupils achieving a grade 5 in Ebacc this year.

The Hold, the new home of the Suffolk Record Office

Preserving Suffolk's history for many years to come – building work is now well underway. Whilst The Hold is primarily a record storing facility, it will be a completely accessible space – once through its front doors there's no need for visitors to use steps or lifts. There will be a dedicated exhibition space which will host four specially curated exhibitions per year, to encourage everyone to interact with Suffolk's culture and history. Most of these exhibitions will be replicated at our Bury St Edmunds and Lowestoft Record Offices, but with a local twist to ensure that the whole county gets involved. A 200-seat tiered auditorium will primarily be used by the University of Suffolk and also host conferences and talks by archivists. There is no other auditorium space with this capacity in Ipswich and it's hoped that it can also be used by the wider community. Another first, for the whole of the county is The Hold's thermal mass maintained strong room. This record storage facility spans an impressive 1650 cubic metres, spread over three floors. It will have enough space to store the records we currently hold in Suffolk and should also comfortably house further records for the next twenty years.

Vaccination rates

Suffolk bucks the national trend for vaccine rates as the UK loses its 'measles free' status – On 21 August it was revealed that national rates for the second MMR (measles, mumps and rubella) vaccine have now fallen to just 87.2 %. This is thought to have led to the large increase in measles cases in England and Wales in 2018 (991 compared to 278 the previous year). However, as a result of the hard work of local healthcare professionals and the engagement of parents, in Suffolk vaccination rates at the end of March 2019 reached 94.5% for the first MMR dose (by 24 months of age) and 90.3% for the second booster dose (by 5 years of age). Following the introduction of a targeted, multi-agency campaign launched in December 2018, vaccination rates in Suffolk for both MMR doses improved between the first quarter and last quarter of 2018/19, by 2.4% for dose one and 3.5% for dose two. This is particularly encouraging at a time when there has been a decrease nationally, with the UK failing to meet the World Health Organisation's (WHO) recommended target of 95% for the second MMR vaccine.

Unsafe goods totalling £23 million detained at the Port of Felixstowe

On 19th August, nearly one million unsafe items had been prevented from entering the UK consumer market in the last year. This is thanks to the work of SCC Trading Standards Imports Team at the Port of Felixstowe. Figures for 2018/19 show that 996,143 items across 670 product lines were targeted, assessed and detained, with an estimated value of over £23 million - products such as baby carriers, strollers, child car seats and electric hot plates . The baby carriers had non-compliant labelling, an easily detachable label which becomes a choking hazard, and the leg openings were too wide meaning that a baby could fall out. Four in five of the UK's consumer goods arrive in the UK by a container. Half of these enter via the Port. Suffolk is one of the few authorities to host a dedicated Imports Team, which is directly funded by National Trading Standards. As well as protecting the public from unsafe items, the team's work also helps to protect legitimate businesses trying to compete on a level playing field.

It's raining.

An hour ago I was up a ladder harvesting fruit. Now I sit seeking inspiration in the rivulets of rainwater trickling down my study window, fruit picking done for the day. The shower will soon pass, and warmed by the early evening sun, the moisture on my window will evaporate back from whence it came. All will be dry once more. Yet wait. Scratch the surface, look beneath those fallen leaves. There, out of sight, the precious moisture sinks slowly into the ground, feeding countless living organisms; blessing the life beneath our feet. There is so much life in the soil, rarely seen, yet as essential for our wellbeing as the fruit I have just harvested. Without the life I can't see, the life I can see wouldn't be.

A momentary shower may not look much. The rain gauge barely registers it. Yet deep beneath my feet, alone, unseen each little drop plays its part. 'Every little helps', as the old adage goes and little showers soon add up. After all, the mightiest river, the largest lake, is but a host of raindrops working together.

The Wider View

There are 106 Roadside Nature Reserves (RNRs) in Suffolk - often remnants of old meadows and important havens for rare plants and corridors for wildlife. Suffolk has more than 4,000 miles of roads, 80% of which are classed as rural so potentially a huge area of wildlife-rich habitat providing connections to avoid isolation of populations and allow expansion of species ranges. Historically, roads started as paths and tracks wandering through the countryside connecting fields and villages but from mediaeval times, as fields were enclosed, the verges, unaffected by agricultural practices the other side of the hedge and being unimproved, retained some of the original flora and associated wildlife.


Most RNRs are managed for specific plants: orchids, wild licorice, rare chalk flora and 34 of them solely for sulphur clover - hence there is a specific cutting routine to prevent coarse grasses and thuggish plants such as nettles and brambles taking over while not preventing the target species to grow and seed. These can be found searching online for *Suffolk Roadside Nature Reserves interactive map*. We have 3 in the parish and several more nearby notably the Beacon Hill and Cedars Park roundabouts! Here are breathtaking

displays of pyramidal orchids in the spring.

Each RNR is marked with white posts. There is provision for volunteer wardens to keep an eye on the sites - CSM does not have any so it is important that people know what the cutting regime is - all our verges should be cut **only in September**. If you are interested in being involved contact this newsletter.



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A Bit of History

By the time you receive this magazine we will be in the month of October; the month when the festival of Hallowe'en is celebrated in several countries around the world. I'm sure Creeting St Mary will be no exception! Whether or not the origin of "All Hallows Eve" lies in Pagan, Gaelic or Christian festivals, it is now that time of year and the reason that various customs and activities are celebrated. However, one character that always appears at Hallowe'en (metaphorically speaking), is the witch. In the 1400s, Christianity came under threat from an invisible force. Starting among the educated elite then spreading like wildfire, the idea emerged that a group of evildoers were acting insidiously and in unison to endanger Christianity: witches. They were believed to accompany the malignant spirits as they travelled the earth requiring barns and homes to be blessed to protect people and livestock from the effects of witches.

From the early 15th to the late 18th century, witchhunt hysteria swept through Europe and the European colonies in America. thousands of women and many men were tried and executed for practising black magic. The majority of those in East Anglia being during the three-year reign of terror of one of medieval history's most notorious figures: Matthew Hopkins (of Great Wenham), the Witchfinder General. During the Civil War period in the mid 17 th century, a man named John Stearne (of Long Melford), was an associate of the self-styled "Witchfinder General"; and came to be

appointed as Hopkins deputy. Through Stearne's allegations, two alleged witches were hanged on 27th August 1645 at Bury St Edmunds. One was Ann Hammer, "near Needham in Suffolk, of Creeting there", the other was Nicholas Hempstead "of Creeting in Suffolk". According to Stearne. Ann Hammer had confessed to him that she had slept with the Devil and also admitted responsibility for the death of a child of Master Campe. So what about Nicholas Hempstead, what had he done? He was alleged to have used witchcraft to kill a horse belonging to a constable who was pressing him to be a soldier, to have killed five of the best horses in Colonel Rochester's Troop and also he made a very large confession about other diverse things he had done.

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Footpaths and Bridleways

I've been asking Suffolk County Council Public Rights of Way (SCC PRoW) for some time now to agree to extinguish the two footpaths and the bridleway that run from Flordon Road to Creeting Hills across the A14. All three routes are very dangerous and impractical to attempt to negotiate; dangerous because they require the user to cross the busy A14 trunk road and impractical because they are extremely difficult to traverse because of the steep embankments and thick undergrowth. In my opinion all three routes need expunging from all maps as soon as possible. I, along with the landowner across whose land the bridleway (BW) runs, are due to meet a PRoW representative on site in mid-September, the reason being because a member of the public fell whilst attempting to use this particular BW (32A). She consequently demonstrated with the land owner - regarding safety, the use of public paths etc. - who subsequently contacted the PRoW reporting the incident and requesting that this particular path be ceased, hence the planned meeting with them. I shall keep you posted.

This month, a CSM parishioner wrote to me regarding a footpath running up the west side of Beacon Hill, on the A140. This is actually a pavement but because of the lack of maintenance has become very dangerous to use because thick undergrowth covering it in parts has made it very narrow. As it also runs adjacent to the fast A140 dual carriageway, the Parish Clerk has written to the SCC Highways department seeking remedial action. Let's hope it gets it.

Please let me know of any issues about any footpath in the parish and remember that a map of all the paths can be seen on the board outside the Diamond Jubilee Village Hall and also on the one just off the footpath at Hawks Mill beside the river (near the entrance to Alder Carr Farm).







Mid Suffolk

I'm having problems with a builder I employed to build a kitchen extension to our house. The foundations are laid, and he's knocked through the back wall - the back of our house is now a tarpaulin sheet. We paid an initial deposit upfront, and then two further amounts in cash for materials. He's now asked for more money - but I'd like to see more work done first. We had a bit of a row, and he hasn't turned up for the last two days. What should I do next?

The Citizens Advice consumer service (0345 04 05 06) is a good first port of call. If you think your relationship with the builder can be salvaged and you'd like him to finish the work, you can try to sit down with him and agree - in writing - a schedule of works and payments you're both happy with. A written contract, should cover exactly what you're paying for and everything you've agreed on, like timings, payments, who will pay for materials and subcontractors. If you pay any future installments by credit card rather than cash you'll also benefit from extra protection from the card provider. Take photos as the work progresses and keep copies of communications and receipts.

If you feel the situation with that trader can't continue you can complain in writing to him or his company and ask for some money back. If you believe the work is substandard you can report problems to Trading Standards via the Citizens Advice consumer service. If he's a member of a trade association they also might be able to help. If that doesn't work, look for an approved alternative dispute resolution (ADR) scheme - this is an independent third party who can help you to reach a compromise. The trader may already be a member of a scheme. If not, they should provide you with the name of a certified scheme and say if they are willing to use it.

Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk can provide advice on this or any other issue, including debt, housing, benefits and family law.

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VET'S ADVICE

Neutering your female dog

If you have a healthy female dog and no intention of breeding, our veterinary advice would be to have her spayed to significantly reduce the risk of serious problems in later life. Traditional spaying involves the removal of the ovaries and uterus, but keyhole surgery or laparoscopic surgery is quickly becoming the more popular option. This is a form of minimally invasive surgery and is considered by many to be the gold standard for neutering female dogs. This method has increased benefits when compared to the traditional (open) surgery:

- reduced pain after the operation
- your pet will return to her normal level of exercise sooner
- a significantly reduced risk of complications.

When can my dog be spayed?

Female dogs can be spayed at any age, but preferably after their first season, to enable them to be fully developed as an adult. We would not wish to spay just before a season, during a season, or during a phantom (false) pregnancy as surgery at these times carries a higher risk.

Advantages:

• spaying prevents the development of a life-threatening infection of the uterus called pyometra

- the incidence of developing mammary tumours has been proven to be reduced in animals that are spayed before their second season
- spaying prevents the development of ovarian and uterine cancers
- spaying prevents unwanted pregnancy. While your dog is 'on heat' you must watch her carefully to avoid unwanted breeding

• spaying will prevent phantom pregnancies.

Dogs that are not spayed will still go through hormonal changes, regardless of whether they are mated or not.

Potential problems

• there's always a small risk with anaesthesia and surgery on any species, but with modern anaesthetics, sophisticated monitoring equipment and professional care, this risk is kept to a minimum

• urinary incontinence in spayed females is uncommon, but can occur in some dogs. This can be controlled well with medication. It is more common in large breeds or overweight dogs

• dogs require less energy after spaying, therefore weight gain is common. However, this is entirely preventable with a healthy diet and proper exercise.
