If that is not enough entertainment – look at what the

CREETING ST MARY PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Traffic Calming - through the village

We are still awaiting the road markings 'Slow' and 'Pedestrians in Road' signage for All Saints Road. The County Councillor has assured us that the work will be carried out as soon as possible. The Vehicle Activated Speed Sign (VAS) is to be installed at Jacks Green on 13th November - powered by a solar panel unit to replace the battery system which needed frequent recharging - done free of charge. . Once the second post near to the village hall, has been has been re-installed and the VAS will th be moved between the two locations.

Red Telephone Kiosk – Jacks Green Road

The Defibrillator should be soon be installed by The Community Heartbeat Trust working closely with BT. It cannot be used until registered with the Emergency Services then can be used by anyone.

Verges in the Village

Due to cutbacks the within the County Council, Suffolk Higways will only cut verges once or twice during the summer months. Other options need to be considered by the Parish Council who will inform residents of its plans. **Noticeboards**

The 'Men's Shed' in Stowmarket are making another noticeboard for All Saints Road, near to the Church. It will be available for villagers to use and view up-coming events. The Noticeboard at Jacks Green has had an issue with the varnish. The Parish Council are sending it back to the supplier.

County Councillor's Report

Thousands of illegal cigarettes seized in Lowestoft raids - 21,880 illegal cigarettes and 10.9kg of rolling tobacco in October Officers have been seized from four different premises by Trading Standards and Suffolk Police. Investigations into the seizures will continue. With these cheap products on the market, it is easier for young people to become hooked on smoking and makes it harder for people to quit. Illegal cigarettes pose a fire risk - when genuine cigarettes are left lit for a period of time, they are designed to self-extinguish. There have been four successful prosecutions In the last twelve months with fines running into tens of thousands of pounds, alongside suspended prison sentences. You can anonymously report someone for selling illicit tobacco by calling the national Citizens Advice consumer helpline on 03454 040506.

Suffolk's gritting fleet gets personal - On 14 October, SprEd Sheeran, Benjamin Gritten and Grit Rhys Jones joined the ranks of Suffolk's gritting service as Suffolk Highways announced its newly named gritting fleet. Suffolk Highways asked attendees at the Suffolk Show to suggest names for its 41 gritting lorries. The 500 suggestions, the names were then judged by a panel including Councillor Mary Evans and BBC Radio Suffolk's Mark Murphy. The people who suggested the winning names were invited to Suffolk Highways' depot at Phoenix House in Ipswich for a certificate presentation and photo

Braking Point returns to help young adults stay safe on Suffolk's roads - The Suffolk Roadsafe board is working with 16 and 17-year-old students. The board is a partnership between Suffolk County Council, Suffolk Fire and Rescue Service, the Police and Crime Commissioner, Suffolk Constabulary, Highways England and the East of England Ambulance Service. The Road Safety Team's Braking Point project relaunched in the week of 7 October visiting 20 schools to deliver the Braking Point play, by Performance in Education, designed to encourage the safe behaviours of drivers and passengers. The theatre tour ends just before the autumn half-term, the Road Safety team will then provide classroom-based follow-up sessions in schools into 2020. The aim is to change behaviour by normalising sensible decision-making shifting students' attitudes to road safety and ultimately make them responsible drivers. See

Central heating systems for Suffolk residents - A further 200 Suffolk homes will soon have their first ever central heating system installed. On 7 October Suffolk's local authorities have secured an additional £760,000 from the Warm Homes Fund allowing the installation of 204 first-time central heating systems in fuel-poor households over the next three years. Around four million UK households are unable to affordably heat their home to the temperature needed to stay warm and healthy. As well as being on low incomes many of these households have heating systems that are inefficient and expensive to run. Fly-tipper billed more than £1,500 for dumping waste in Stowupland

12 sacks of household waste were found dumped in November 2018 in Stonebridge Lane, Stowupland by Sgt Brian Calver from the Suffolk's Rural Policing team and the offender was traced. The court fined the offender £1,000, with costs of £477.41 and a victim surcharge of £100. The Suffolk Waste Partnership of all the Suffolk Councils, the County and partners, is launching a campaign over the winter aimed at reducing fly tipping in Suffolk.

The SCRAP fly-tipping campaign

The Suffolk Waste Partnership, which consists of all the Suffolk Council's including the County and partners are launching an online campaign aimed at reducing fly-tipping in Suffolk.

The SCRAP fly-tipping campaign is aimed at residents and businesses whose waste is sometimes fly-tipped by unlicensed operators, who often offer to remove waste at a 'bargain' price – only to then dump it.

The campaign centres around remembering to follow the SCRAP code when arranging for anyone else to take away your waste:

Suspect – beware of rogue waste carriers who dump waste illegally – often at a bargain price. If in doubt, do not let them take your waste.

Check -Ask for their waste carriers registration details. You can check on the Environment Agency website or by calling 08708 506506. Note down the registration number of the vehicle used to take your waste away.

Refuse unsolicited offers – always carry out your own research and choose who you want to take your waste away.

Ask questions – ask what is going to happen to your waste and seek evidence that it was be disposed of appropriately. A legitimate professional operator won't object to being asked reasonable questions.

Paperwork – make sure you get a proper invoice and receipt for your waste. Many of these operators advertise on social media, and so this is where the campaign will be primarily delivered. If you are a user of Facebook or Twitter, you will be able to follow the campaign on the 'Suffolk Recycling' pages – it would be great if you could help spread the word by re-posting and sharing the posts. Planting trees from the Woodland Trust

We have 610 trees and shrubs being delivered to the College Farm on Friday 29th November. They have been allocated to various members of the parish who have the space and are willing to plant some trees. At this time of elections it is worth noting that there have been commitments to plant between £30million and £100million trees in the UK, given there are approximately 12800 parishes across the UK this would mean every parish planting approximately 2500-8000 trees.

We very much hope that the woodland trust will continue with their free tree scheme next year. And landowners – assuming the deal is the same next year, the parish gets free 90m of hedging but more is available with a huge 75% discount. There are a large number of hedgless fields and it would eb great to see some of these planted up *Hugo Craggs*

A Bit of History

We Will Remember Them

I feel that it is appropriate to write the following in this month's newsletter: The words below will, I'm sure, be familiar to you:

They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old; Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them.

How many are aware that these lines form the fourth verse of the 7-verse poem "For *the Fallen*" written by British poet Laurence Binyon (10 August 1869 – 10 March 1943)? Laurence said in 1939 that the four lines of the fourth stanza came to him first. He composed the poem while sitting on the cliff-top looking out to sea from the dramatic scenery of the north Cornish coastline. A plaque marks the location at Pentire Point, north of Polzeath. These words have become especially familiar and famous, having been adopted by the Royal British Legion as an Exhortation for ceremonies of Remembrance to commemorate fallen Servicemen and women.






Our monthly walking group continues and very well supported this month.



Mid Suffolk

My gas and electricity deal has come to an end and the energy company has offered me a new contract. However, they're insisting I get a smart meter fitted. I've heard these don't really work and I can't see the benefit. Am I better off looking for a different supplier, or will the new company also force me to have a smart meter?

It's always worth shopping around. Citizens Advice has a tool on its website which can help. The *energy star rating* looks at how well suppliers perform on a range of measures, including customer service, rather than just price.

As regards the smart meter, you certainly don't have to accept one. A supplier can't tell you that you must have one installed. However, it might mean you're not eligible for all the deals on offer. In future the cheaper tariffs offered by suppliers might only be available to customers with smart meters.

If you do decide to go ahead, your supplier should explain the process beforehand, show you how it works and give you a number to call if anything goes wrong.


There are benefits to smart meters, they send daily meter readings to your supplier, meaning they can bill you accurately for the energy you've used. They won't automatically save you money, but you can use the digital 'in-home' display to keep track of how much energy you're using and then try to reduce it.
