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Editorial Comment

SUMMER TIME.... AND THE LIVING IS EASY

Getting outside is good for us (see: https://www.nhs.uk/: search for 'mental health' and 'walking for health' and 'SAD' (seasonal affective disorder) - just a short period of brisk activity can do amazing things - from improving mood and self-esteem to many health benefits. Just being in any green space can achieve this. Exposure to sunlight has physiological benefits such as boosting vitamin D production - this is made by our bodies and is used to extract calcium and phosphorus from food to make strong bones and teeth. There is a worrying increase in rickets in the UK because children are not outside enough and are slathered with sunblock. Lack of sunshine decreases production of the hormones melatonin - making us lethargic and seratonin - making us depressed - and may affect our body clock too. Pills are not the answer; overdosing can be toxic and anyway sunshine is free.

Mental health is an issue raised this month by Dan Poulter M.P. and a composed mind might help cope better with issues such as Rev. Phillip Payne discusses. So get out there!

This should be safer with the speed radar installed as parents are more likely to walk kids to school or go on a ramble along the many footpaths Paul Scully keeps an eye on and there will be an information point with maps at the newly painted red telephone box at Jack's Green.

You may soon need to go no further than Blacksmith's Field where a playground for adults is being planned to compliment the wonderul new childrens' play equipment. If the Parish Council's plans for tree planting come about that will be useful exercise; but please don't be cutting hedges while birds are nesting. You can Ride and Stride to raise money for Suffolk's historic churches or visit gardens with the Horticultural Society. And the village allotments - can anyone tell us about those?

The Social Club too has been very active organising outdoor events. It's probably a good thing we don't have too many Pudding Evenings!

We welcome two new Mid Suffolk/Baburgh District Lib Dem Councillors: Mike Norris and Steve Phillips - we hope to see them at PC meetings and village events. The result of the District Council elections was interesting with the Greens increasing from 6 to 12 councillors out of 34 members, possibly reflecting increased interest in and concern about our local environment; in addition there are 5 Lib. Dems, 16 Con and 1 Independant. With the boundary changes and CSM now in with the more 'urban' Needham Market rather than more rural wards, the village must make it's voice heard as priorities may be different!

Elections

Following the local Elections and boundary changes Creeting St Mary is now part of a Ward with Creeting St Peter and Needham Market so we no longer have Suzie Morley as our District Councillor. Our new District Councillors are Mike Norris and Steve Phillips and the Parish Council look forward to working with them in the future. Thank you to Suzie Morley for all her past help. **Speeding through the village**

Our County Councillor, Matthew Hicks, has agreed to fund road markings "Slow" and 'Pedestrians in Road' signage for All Saints Road to help alleviate health and safety issues when parents are walking their children to and from school. Unfortunately, the white lines along from the school to the village hall, to designate part of the road for pedestrians have been turned down by Suffolk Highways as the road is too narrow. The radar sign is on order and should be in place soon.

Noticeboard – Jacks Green

The new Noticeboard for beside the bench at Jacks Green, is nearly completed all thanks to the 'Men's Shed' in Stowmarket. Once in place please feel free to pin up your notices and information!

Red Telephone Kiosk – Jacks Green Road

Plans are still underway for the red telephone kiosk at Jacks Green to be used as an 'Information Point' for walkers, where a footpath map, along with highlighted points of interest, historical facts and information leaflets will be housed.

County Councillor's Report

Suffolk stage of 2019 OVO Energy Women's (cycle) Tour on 10 June starts in the centre of Beccles at 10.30 with 96 riders from 16 teams. The finish on Ipswich Road in Stowmarket is expected between 2.30pm and 3.10pm. Riders will tackle two SKODA Queen of the Mountains climbs and contest three intermediate Eisberg Sprints from Beccles to Stowmarket. The race continues to form part of the prestigious UCI Women's WorldTour series, which began with the Strade Bianche one-day race in Italy on 9 March. **School places.**

On National Offer Day, 16 April 2019, the Council reported that it had received 7,505 applications from parents' on their choice of primary school. Over 98.6% were offered a place at one of their preferred schools. Gordon Jones, Cabinet Member for Children's Services, Education and Skills at Suffolk County Council said: *"I am delighted that we have been able to give most parents a place for their child at one of the schools they want."*

Mental Health in Suffolk

In recent months, the challenges facing the Norfolk and Suffolk Mental Health Trust have been well publicised. Mental health services in our area need to improve.

Since the Trust was put into crisis measures (Special Measures), I have worked to ensure that health bosses are held to account and improvements made quickly and effectively.

As a practising NHS mental-health doctor, I am uniquely placed to be a critical friend of the Trust as it makes these changes, attending regular meetings with ministers and Clinical Commissioning Groups (the people with the money that funds health services) in Norfolk and Suffolk, as well as with the Trust itself.

Things do appear to be (slowly) improving. It is encouraging to see the new leadership at the Trust, with new Chair, Marie Gabriel, and Chief Executive, Professor Jonathan Warren, joining from the East London Trust, one of the most successful in the country. Their expertise will be invaluable.

There will be an extra £5.7m for psychological (talking) therapies, long-term mental health conditions like schizophrenia, crisis resolution and early intervention. The Trust is also working with local charities to improve resources relating to suicide prevention and dementia. This represents a 6.3% increase in mental health investment locally, far exceeding the national Mental Health Investment Standard. I am optimistic that these changes will help deliver substantially-improved care for patients in Suffolk.

There has been a lot of talk about restructuring: for me, this is unwanted and irrelevant. What matters is the quality of the services. I fear that splitting the Trust into three smaller units could create more problems than it solves, as the focus would be on restructuring rather than on improving the care and support for patients. I hope that our local health leaders agree.

From my medical perspective, I understand that mental health is one of the biggest challenges facing Norfolk and Suffolk. There is much to do, but I am confident that the Trust can and will be turned around.

I am pleased to be playing my part, holding ministers to account and providing a voice for those suffering from mental health issues locally. I am in the unique position to be able to stand up for the needs of mental-health patients in Suffolk, and I shall continue to do so.

We are beset by many challenges. Yet these challenges need not dominate our lives. Spring has sprung. New life is emerging; ready for us to embrace the opportunities it presents.





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
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CREETING ST. MARY VA PRIMARY SCHOOL

The Wider View

Hedges are Homes

Wild birds are having a tough time as the places they choose to nest (and they are sometimes very picky!) are reducing all the time. Wrens, robins, dunnocks, whitethroats, the delightful long-tailed tit, song thrushes, blackbirds, chaffinches and greenfinches all use them as well as hedgehogs and other animals. They are an important source of insects and other food. The wider and thicker the hedge the less opportunity for crows and magpies to find and raid nests. If you can see through it - so can a magpie!

It is an offence under the Wildlife and Countryside Act of 1981 to intentionally damage or destroy the nest, eggs, chicks or adults of any wild bird at any time. The RSPB recommend not cutting hedges and trees between March and August - the main breeding season.

It is an intentional act if you know there is an active nest and damage or destroy the nest or contents. If you notice hedge-cutting endangering a nest, politely point out the nest, and mention the laws protecting them. If they proceed, contact the police on 101, and ask for a reference number. 

St Mary's Church Roof Appeal

In 2015 we identified the need to reroof St Mary's church. Splitting the work into 2 phases, the north aisle was re-roofed in the spring of 2017 at a cost of £34,000. £27,500 was raised through specific local donations, fund-raising, and money that had been given to us over the years to spend on the fabric. Only £6,500 came from grants from foundations and trusts. We now need a further £46,000 to complete the work; re-roofing the north slope of the nave, the porch and the organ area. So far, we have raised £10,000 from grant-funding applications, and a further £6,500 from local giving and fund-raising. We also expect to make another major commitment from our Fabric Fund (which will leave little for other work. All this is in addition to funding our daily running costs.

St Mary's Church has served the community for centuries: a place of worship, a place to celebrate life, a place to find rest and peace. It is also a place to grow, with the village school regular and frequent users.

The building is Grade 2* listed which brings its own joys and liabilities. Above all, as with previous generations, we are guardians not owners. The roofing and associated work we are undertaking should ensure that the building stands to serve the Community of Creeting St Mary for future generations. If anyone would be willing to help with this effort, with however small an amount, we would be very grateful. 
Footpaths and Bridleways

At the end of March I received an acknowledgement from Suffolk County Council regarding a broken FP sign that I had reported a week or so earlier. It was sited at the junctions of FPs 20, 21, 22 and 34 (the path from All Saint's Road towards Creeting College Farm) but unfortunately it has not been replaced yet.

The landowner across whose land FP19 crosses, has made an application to divert it. FP19 currently leaves All Saint's Road at the beginning of the double bend on the north-east side of the solitary detached house known as Highfields and runs diagonally down the field to the gate at the bottom to join FPs 20 &18. The route of the diversion will not prevent access to the lower field. The proposed route is to leave All Saint's Road on the north-west side of Highfields and run, fairly straight, down to FPs20 & 18, via the existing gate.

Please let me know if you have issues about any footpath in the parish and remember that a map of all the paths can be seen on the board outside the Diamond Jubilee Village Hall and on the one just off the footpath at Hawks Mill beside the river (near the entrance to Alder Carr Farm).

A BIT OF HISTORY

I have reproduced below two picture postcards from Creeting St Mary resident, Kim Barker. The first, addressed to Miss J. Calver, The Watering, Creeting, Nr. Needham Market, Suffolk, was stamped on September 15th 1904 and postmarked Weybridge. The secon, addressed to Miss R. Thompson, Post Office, Creeting St

Mary, Needham Market, was stamped on April 25th 1905 and postmarked Ipswich. Postage for each card was a ha'penny stamp. The reverse of the first carries a photograph of Christchurch Mansion Ipswich & the second, Stonegate Street, York.

So, who were the two ladies to whom the cards were addressed? Well, I've browsed the Creeting St Mary 1901 census on the

chance that I may find them there, 3 or 4 years before; unfortunately I can find no match for either. However, I did find an Esther Thompson. The census record shows that she was in residence at The Post Office and her relationship with the "Head of Family", Elijah Harvey, was "niece". Her age wa 12 and no occupation was recorded.


The dry weather has helped us to get on well with our winter work programme and the volunteers have cleared around the pond and created more scalloped ride edges to let in the sunlight. Richard Cage and his Virgin Media colleagues have done a great job in widening the ride we share with James Buckle's part of the wood and now it is all done it looks fabulous. A significant milestone was passed in February when the Mid Week Team coppiced the compartment by the field entrance: it was last done in the late 1980's and this is the first area to be recut under the Suffolk Wildlife Trust's stewardship of the wood. The hazel regrowth was really strong and it is great to see the wood really getting back into the cycle of coppice management with all the benefits for wildlife such as dormice, woodland birds and butterflies that this brings. The management plan for Bonny is now up for revision and we look forward to bringing more of the wood into coppice rotation, cleaning out the pond again and continuing to improve the rides so they are more attractive to wildlife.

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



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citizens advice

Mid Suffolk

I'm 3 months pregnant and just beginning to show, so last week I thought I'd sit down with my manager and let them know before any speculation could take place. My manager was really happy for me, but this week I've been pulled aside and told they're letting me go due to poor performance. I've worked here for 2 years and never had any negative feedback so I don't understand. Could they be sacking me just for being pregnant? Is this legal?

No matter how long you've been working for your employer, being fired because of pregnancy-related issues, is automatically classed as unfair dismissal.

Although your employer said you were being sacked for poor performance, you're right to be suspicious as this only came to light after you told your manager about your pregnancy. If your employer says your dismissal has nothing to do with you having a baby, you will need to prove that it was. You can ask your employer to send you written reasons for your dismissal.

As you have been employed for two years, your employer can only dismiss

you for specified fair reasons, such as gross misconduct or persistent poor performance. Except in the most serious cases of gross misconduct, your employer will be expected to follow a fair process and show the dismissal was for a fair reason.

If you want to challenge the dismissal, you can take your case to an employment tribunal. You should first raise a grievance with your employer and contact the Advisory Conciliation and Arbitration Service about Early Conciliation. Be sure to act quickly as time limits in employment tribunals are short.

It's in your best interest to gather as much evidence as possible in case the problem can't be resolved without going to tribunal. This includes emails with your employer about your pregnancy, previous performance appraisals, and correspondence about you being dismissed. The new Citizens Advice Discrimination Toolkit, found on their website, can help you with this.

VET'S ADVICE

Unwanted guests: Dealing with fleas and ticks

After a recent spell of hot summer weather, fleas and ticks are rife, so it is important to treat your pet if you haven't done so already.

Flea bites are uncomfortable, sore and itchy – for us as well as our pets – but they can cause more severe skin problems for pets with flea allergies. Flea infestations can sometimes even cause anaemia due to the blood loss, with very serious consequences. Once an infestation takes hold in the home, it can be difficult to get rid of and you will often need to treat the house as well as pets.

Meanwhile, ticks transmit bacteria that can cause diseases including Lyme disease and babesiosis. Ticks live in long grass, woods and moorland areas near deer and sheep. To help protect yourself on dog walks, wear long-sleeved tops and tuck trousers into socks. At home, check your clothes and your pet for ticks.


If you find a tick on your pet, it is important to remove it as soon as possible to reduce the risk of disease spreading. Do not squeeze the tick's body, as this may increase the risk of infection. There are special tools for tick removal that you can buy from your vet, but it is important that they are removed effectively to avoid the head of the tick remaining in the skin, which can cause an abscess to form. If in doubt, go to your veterinary surgery and a nurse can remove the tick safely.

When it comes to fleas and ticks, prevention is better than cure so it is important to keep up-to-date with a good quality flea control recommended by your vet. There are various different types of treatment, including a spot-on for cats and a chewable tablet for dogs that will protect against fleas and ticks for up to 12 weeks. These are only available from your vet.

Lots of products are available to buy in pet shops and supermarkets, but it is best

to see your vet, as prescription-only flea and tick treatments are far more effective. If your pet already has fleas, you will also need to treat your home by vacuuming thoroughly and washing any bedding or other fabric that may have been exposed to fleas at 60°.
