

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### **Editorial Comment**

The gas failed in the middle of cooking lunch, the problem was entirely ours - the regulator had packed up on the bottled gas . This got me to thinking - am I prepared for things I really rely on being unavailable and should I be taking steps? Sometimes by confronting problems you can develop new skills.

Some absences have been rather welcome: not having to travel to meetings – once I had mastered zoom and learned to un-mute myself without being asked. I haven't missed going shopping – except garden centres being closed - but I have discovered you can save seeds from year to year - and have tried my hand at taking cuttings.

Of course the minute there is less traffic we have village traffic calming measures in place - but this should deter cars from speeding on the quieter roads. I hope that people living on their own or in reduced circumstances because of the situation have managed to benefit from the increased assistance from websites. phone lines and food banks and that hard-pressed businesses have taken full advantage of the grants on offer, as highlighted in this edition.

However, in some occupations people have been run off their feet – in food retailing as people are shopping locally in unprecedented numbers and of course in hospitals and schools battling to keep things under control often with reduced staff and uncertainty in the rules and regulations. We are grateful for their continuing efforts.

I have rather welcomed not having to queue at the doctor, dentist and optician as appointments are kept well to time- and going to the dump (after an isolation-induced clear-out) was a dream with no waiting and fewer people at the skips.

Nature has acquired a new status, providing an escape and the ability to meet up 'socially distanced' of course - and it is good to read that SCC is putting resources this way and 'strengthening' biodiversity. Let us hope when it comes to tricky areas such as planning policy they put their money where their vision is!

On the flip side there is concern about this new-found popularity – a survey of 300 people visiting the Lake District at Whitsun returned some interesting figures – for 20% it was their first visit; 18% met friends; 70% brought alcohol and 25% a barbecue. The rubbish was often left behind and tons had to be cleared up and fires extinguished. Then there is the increased disturbance to wildlife by cyclists, uncontrolled dogs and people keeping away from each other, resulting in nesting birds disturbed to the point of desertion and slow worms and flowers crushed under wheel and foot. Not the communing with nature envisaged! If we want to be able to roam free as well as see Larks and Lapwings and halt the devastating decline in farmland birds, steps must be taken to have undisturbed areas for them.

So there has been a lot of change and hopefully some of the better changes will stick. With the prospect of not seeing the family much this Christmas we have decided to limit present giving by doing 'Secret Santa' so each person gets one really worthwhile present from one other person.

Things continue to happen - the litter gets picked up, the newsletter delivered, the village committees are still running - in the hope we can meet up prperly next year. But you can be sure - it will not be 'normal'.

As always may I thank all those who have contributed to the Newsletter in particular my co-editor Kathryn Martin and the stalwart deliverers to over 350 houses.

**Traffic Calming Measures -** You may have seen that a post has been installed on the grass verge corner, opposite the Village Hall. This is to house our second speed sign, which is currently on order and will be installed in the near future.

### **County Councillor's Report**

The Home, But Not Alone free phone line is up and running again - The phone line which supports vulnerable people in our communities who may be struggling with the impact of Coronavirus was paused in August because of low demand and the lifting of Covid-19 restrictions. However, in light of Thursday's national lockdown, the service is now up and running again. The phoneline was absolutely vital during the first lockdown and it is only right that the same support is on offer as we head into the next wave of lockdown. The phoneline helped thousands of people and families, who often didn't have a network of family or friends to call upon, access emergency support such as food and medicine deliveries and befriending schemes. Its success was down to the amazing local networks that sprung up across towns and villages in Suffolk and looked after those most in need. The telephone number is freephone 0800 876 6926 and will be staffed from 9am to 5pm Monday to Friday.

This Home, But Not Alone phoneline compliments The Suffolk Advice and Support Service phoneline (freephone 0800 068 3131). It can help with debt advice, budgeting, mortgage, rent or credit card problems and employment queries. This phoneline, delivered by the Collaborative Communities Covid-19 Board. Call handlers use resources and information from across many Suffolk organisations and specialist providers, which are tailored to individual needs. Some of the help provided to date includes:

- Supporting families with food and fuel vouchers, paying utility bills, and buying school uniforms.
- Buying a bike for a man to get to his new job, after losing his old job due to Covid-19 and having to sell his car to cover expenses.
- Buying special boots for a child with disabilities, which the family could no longer afford.
  - Covering rent arrears for people.

SCC announces £228,000 for tree-planting, protecting hedgerows and verges - Suffolk's natural environment will receive investment for tree-planting, restoring hedgerows, and improving roadside verges for wildlife. £228,000 from the Suffolk 2020 Fund will enable SCC to enhance its work to protect and encourage biodiversity in the county. Working with The Woodland Trust, Suffolk Tree Wardens, landowners, and county farm tenants, the funding will support the planting of around 100,000 trees, including replanting hedgerows in suitable locations across Suffolk over the





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next 18 months. It will also help establish around 10 community tree nurseries, which will support more planting in years to come. Local volunteers will be supported to collect seeds, set up nursery beds and grow trees in their communities. The funding will also be used to trial better ways to manage roadside verges for wildlife. This includes exploring the use of new technology and cutting techniques, as well as developing new partnerships with parishes and landowners. The funding will help expand the existing Roadside Nature Reserve network managed by the council with the help of volunteers, seeing a 25% increase in the overall length of verges managed for wildlife. Increased tree planting will allow us to offset carbon emissions, though we are continuing to work to eliminate the council's emissions where possible, as part of our commitment to our climate emergency declaration. But this is much more than just planting trees and walking away. We are setting up the support needed to allow trees, hedgerows and verges to thrive for years to come, including in urban areas. We are committed to a 'right tree, right place' policy and to working with others. This will be achieved through a new Suffolk Tree Partnership, involving many others across Suffolk, to support local communities and landowners to help manage and increase tree cover. We will also work with others to develop a 'healing wood' initiative as a way of recognising the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on our communities. With Suffolk's healing woods we will all have access to natural spaces, where we can reflect on our own experiences of the pandemic or take a quiet moment to grieve for loved ones. People in Suffolk can have their say on plans for a 'healing' woodland space in memory of those who died from Covid-19. A survey has now been launched online for people to share their thoughts and preferences on what they would like to see. The potential locations are to be identified in the new year. **Suffolk MP visits site at the A140 in Brome** and is 'delighted' with the improvements - On 19 October, Member of Parliament for Central Suffolk and North Ipswich, Dr Dan Poulter, visited the junction improvement works at the A140 in Brome, near Eye Airfield. The visit was hosted by Suffolk County Council and Interserve, the improvement scheme's contractor. The works will improve journey time and road safety in the area and provide better access to the Eye Airfield Development Area. The improvements include:

- Two new roundabout junctions on the A140 Castleton Way and south of Rectory Road.
  - A link road through to B1077 from the Northern roundabout.
- Restricted movements at the A140/B1077 junction: prohibit right turns in and out, improving journey times and safety
  - Closure of the A140/Rectory Road junction.
  - Landscaping and new pathways for walkers and cyclists.

Feasibility studies were carried out along the stretch of road by SCC following concerns expressed by members of the public and local stakeholders about access to and from businesses based on the Industrial Park, with lengthy queues and delays entering and exiting the area. The main access into the Industrial Park is via a busy junction and the flow of traffic is regularly slowed or halted by vehicles attempting to enter or leave the site, creating the risk of accidents and diminished road safety. SCC would like to thank residents for their patience regarding these vital improvement works. There have been delays due to the COVID-19 pandemic, which have been

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unavoidable. We are trying to claw back some of the time we have lost, and we will keep the local community updated on the revised timescale. Once the improvement works are completed, the new road layout will unlock Eye Airfield for economic development. There will also be significant highway benefits because access to the A140 will be safer and more efficient, resolving long standing safety and congestion issues. Adopt East launches - 14 October marked the launch of Adopt East, a regional adoption agency which has been established to recruit adopters across the East of England. Adopt East will work across local authorities in Southend, Thurrock, Essex, Suffolk, Norfolk, Hertfordshire, Bedford and Luton to find families for children who are waiting to find their forever home. Adoptionplus, Barnardo's, and Adoption UK are also part of the partnership. The Adopt East alliance will deliver the highest quality adoption service to children and families throughout the region by bringing together the expertise and skills of all its partners. The scale of the organisation means that adopters will have access to a larger number of children waiting for adoption. This will help partners to match children with the right family for them, at the earliest opportunity. Adopt East is committed to providing good quality adoption support services to support all families with their adoption journey. In Suffolk we have been working hard to find loving and supportive families for children waiting for adoption. These children have not always had the best start in life and really do deserve to find their forever homes. The adoption process can seem daunting for families, but SCC have a wealth of experience and are there to support families every step of the way. Adopt East is great news for Suffolk as it will mean we can draw on expertise and skills from across the whole region to help us to find the right families for our children. ### **District Councillor's Report**

MID SUFFOLK AND BABERGH UPDATED DRAFT JOINT LOCAL PLAN: Mid Suffolk and Babergh District Councils have published their Pre-Submission Updated Draft Joint Local Plan and representations are invited to be submitted during a 6-week consultation period which runs until 12 noon on Thursday 24th December 2020. **CROSS-PARTY COUNCILLORS IN AGREEMENT ON RESPONSE TO PLANNING SYSTEM OVERHAUL**: Mid Suffolk and Babergh District Councillors are united in their response to the Government's Planning for the Future consultation—insisting that proposals must not be at the detriment of local communities and should not lose focus on the challenges facing rural districts.

**NEW COVID-19 SUPPORT GRANT LAUNCHED:** Businesses in Mid Suffolk and Babergh who have had to close their doors to customers as part of the current national lockdown may be eligible for a second wave of grant funding. As businesses across the country once again face restrictions as part of the nationwide strategy to



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help control the spread of Covid-19, the Government has launched the Local Restrictions Business Support Grant. The Local Restrictions Business Support Grant is open to businesses who were trading as usual on week commencing 2nd November, who are liable for business rates, and are one of the businesses required to close during the second lockdown. The grants will be administered by Mid Suffolk and Babergh District Councils to businesses in the region once they have applied via the councils' website. COUNCILS TO CONSULT ON CIL CHARGING RATES: Mid Suffolk and Babergh District Councils are seeking views on revised Community Infrastructure Levy charges for developers – helping to provide communities with the facilities they need to keep pace with growth. A public consultation to seek feedback on the revised rates, started on Thursday 12th November and residents, businesses, and voluntary organisations are invited to have their say before the six-week consultation closes on 24th December. These responses will then be considered by the councils, before being submitted to a Planning Inspector for public examination, prior to the implementation of proposed CIL charging rates in both districts. Details of the consultation can be found on Babergh District Council's website and Mid Suffolk District Council's website. GREEN LIGHT FOR COUNCILS' BIODIVERSITY VISION: Mid Suffolk and Babergh District Councils' cabinets unanimously agreed their Biodiversity Action Plan on Thursday 9th November, setting out how they aim to protect and strengthen biodiversity in the districts. The plan was developed by a cross-party Biodiversity Task Force, supported by experts. It is the product of biodiversity emergency motions passed by both councils in 2019. Its approval forms a key step towards achieving the councils' ambitions to protect and enhance the environment, and links to their Joint Carbon Reduction Management Plan.

Residents are also being encouraged to take action, however small, to increase biodiversity in their communities. This includes things such as installing bird and bat boxes, planting flowers to attract bees, creating hedgehog corridors, and being biodiversity-conscious when gardening.

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# From the Rectory

### CHRISTMAS ISN'T CANCELLED

It was the usual government inspired muddle. Everyone ordered to return to their home town to register for a census. No one thought of where they would all stay, or even how they would travel. The roads were dusty and busy, the journey slow. By the time Joseph and his heavily pregnant young wife arrived in Bethlehem the inns were all full. The best they could find was a pile of straw in the corner of a stable, better than a doorway.

And so it was that in a stable, far from home and family, watched over only by her anxious husband, young Mary gave birth. Her first-born, a son whom they called Jesus. It should have been a joyous family occasion. Instead, the only visitors that night were a group of shepherds who came with a strange account of a vision of angels. To make matters worse, the young family would soon be refugees, fleeing a massacre. The angels may have celebrated, no one else could.

The birth of a child, 'mother and baby doing well', is always a moment of hope. Looking back, we know that the birth of this child was truly a moment to celebrate. But amidst all the festivities we must not lose sight of how fraught with dirt, danger and fear; how inauspicious it must have looked at the time.

Two millennia later and, once again, our plans are thrown into confusion. At the time of writing (mid- November), much of England is closed. Even Santa is doing virtual calls (no COVID Passport I hear) – but then Zoom is so much cleaner than all those sooty old chimneys. Amidst all the uncertainty I have even heard it said "Christmas is cancelled'.

Christmas is not cancelled. Our celebrations may be muted, may be delayed, but with apologies to John Betjeman, it is true that 'God was man in Palestine and lives today in bread and wine' and, although Betjeman didn't say it, lives also in the hearts of his people.

### **VILLAGE COMMITTEES**

The co-editors realised that neither knew all the differences between the many village related committees and thought maybe others were similarly confused.

The Parish Council (PC), whose members are listed elsewhere, are effectively the government of the village, responsible for setting the budget for the precept, which affects the Council Tax, dealing with planning applications, provision of play facilities and allotments where applicable and general village matters. In the event of a local emergency they would institute their Emergency Plan, and in the current situation it was the PC who set up a support system to help vulnerable residents, assisting with delivery of this newsletter as one example. Suffolk Association of Local Councils (SALC) is the upper layer of the system, giving advice and guidance on implementation of local government policy.

The PC are trustees of the Village Hall and of Blacksmith's Field, but delegate management of the hall to the Village Hall Management Committee who deal with day to day running of the hall, including fabric maintenance and bookings. This committee has charitable status and it is for this reason that the Social Club, responsible for provision of alcohol and social activities is a separate entity, though the two are fairly closely linked. Blacksmith's Field committee is another separate group with links to all these other ones.

**The Parochial Church Council** are separate and deal solely with church and graveyard matters

Yet another committee is the **Creeting St Mary Welfare Charity**, responsible for managing and distributing certain grants amongst villagers, derived from the two funds of Dunche's Charity set up in 1795 and that of John Campe set up in 1619.

Of course there are in addition other groups such as the Women's Institute and similar local clubs who all have their own organisational arrangements.

With the exception of the PC, whose members are formally elected, most of the other groups are more informally run and often it is the same few people who serve on several committees, although new blood is always welcome.

### A Bit of History

This month and at this time of year, I thought it appropriate to re-visit an article that I wrote for the Newsletter in January 2014, a time almost 100 years since the start of the "Great War". It is now almost the 101st anniversary of when the War Memorial in Creeting St Mary churchyard was unveiled by Lieut.-Col. R. D. Wylde (Royal Artillery) on the afternoon of Sunday 15th February 1920.

The photograph below shows the unveiling ceremony. Veterans of the war are in attendance along with probably some of the widows. Many villagers young and old, men and women are standing in silence with the Church choir standing to the right-hand side of the sombre gathering. In the distance can be seen the faint image of the Gipping Valley.

Inscribed on the East and West sides of the memorial are the 16 names of those who fell in the Great War. On the North side is an inscription which serves as a poignant reminder: Their Name Liveth For Evermore

A fund was set-up after the Great War to pay for the cost of the stone memorial, the inscriptions and its erection – a copy of the cost of materials is below (The total subscriptions collected from well over 200 individuals and groups was £152 5s 9d. A surplus of 12 shillings and threepence was deposited in the bank).

The list is endless, with so many working right across the festive season to ensure that services continue day and night — carers visiting the elderly and vulnerable in our communities, highways teams, ambulance staff and paramedics, firefighters and police officers, to name but a few. And then there is the army of hard-working public-sector staff, working behind the scenes, to keep everything running smoothly.

Collectively they ensure that our communities are safe and functioning over the festive period, so please spare a thought for all those working tirelessly on our behalf, often in challenging circumstances, yet remaining committed to delivering services compassionately and professionally, despite knowing their loved ones are waiting at home to enjoy Christmas with them after a lengthy shift.

I would therefore like to pay special tribute to all our dedicated and hardworking workforce here in Suffolk, thank you for all you do at Christmas, and all year round.

### **Footpaths and Bridleways**


This month I thought I'd deviate slightly and introduce an option to the walkers in the Parish which will take you perhaps a little further afield – it's called The Magnall Round and is a circular walk of 21 miles that starts and finishes at Needham Market Railway Station. The walk passes through the rolling countryside of Mid-Suffolk a place which is rarely visited by outsiders, a hidden gem.

Depending on your interest, the walk can be done in one full go, two circular walks of 10 and 11 miles or four sections of 4-6 miles allowing use of public transport. It uses public rights of way, paths, tracks and riverside paths passing through the Parishes of Barking, Darmsden, Baylham and Great Blakenham and on to the Parishes of The Creetings along the riverside path of the River Gipping .

Passing Needham Lake, popular for picnics and watching birdlife, the walk carries on to Creeting St Mary and Creeting St Peter before reaching Badley and Battisford with a number of churches on route. The smallest church is at Darmsden, a little hamlet with no more than 17 houses, the second smallest District in Suffolk. The route then finishes in Needham Market.

The route's creator, Derek Magnall is a very experienced walker who has lived in Needham Market for the past 18 years. He has previously written and published eight walks in Lancashire, where he originated, and in Yorkshire. He hopes the Magnall Round will be as popular and give much pleasure to future walkers.

# The impact of the coronavirus lockdown

I'd like some advice on keeping my energy bills down please. I work in admin for a big corporation. We've been working from home since lockdown, and have been told we'll not be back in the office before January at the earliest. Now the weather has turned, I'm freezing sitting here all day in front of my computer! I'm worried if I turn the heating up my bills are going to go through the roof!

I'm sorry this is causing you to worry. However, fortunately, there's lots you can do to keep bills down.

Firstly, see if you can get a better deal by changing your energy supplier. However, as well as comparing prices, it's a good idea to check the customer service record of a company before switching. Citizens Advice has a price comparison tool on our website, and our star rating assesses the customer service records of the 40 biggest companies.

There are also little, everyday things that can help, such as making sure televisions and other devices are switched off and not left on standby; washing clothes on a lower temperature; and only filling the kettle with the water you need.

If your pay is close to the national minimum wage, the extra costs of working from home could be counted as a pay cut and bring you below the legal level. Talk to your manager or HR department, or your union rep if that feels more comfortable.

Finally, your employer should pay for any costs connected to your health and safety - such as a suitable chair for work at a computer. It's also worth taking a look at your employer's expenses policy, you may be able to claim for a number of other things, such as printer ink or telephone line rental.

### What you need to know to access our services safely

From May 2020 all appointments with a doctor need to be made via our eConsult service. This is a secure, clinical, on-line service which can be found on our website: www.needhamsurgery.co.uk or via the NHS app. You do not need a log in or password to use this service. If you do not have internet access a member of the reception team will be able to help by processing an eConsult on your behalf. Please call 01449 720666 and select option 2.

For Nurse or Phlebotam, appointments either use eConsult requesting via the admin pathway or call us on the usual number to book.

We are asking patients NOT to visit the surgery unless you have

- 1. A pre-booked appointment with us
- 2. Need to collect from our dispensary

When you do come to the surgery we ask that you wear a face covering when on the premises and try not to arrive too early for your appointment to support social distancing in the waiting room.

If you have a mobile phone you may be asked to wait in your car. If you have a nurse or GP appointment and they will call you in directly when they are ready for you.

The Practice is strongly encouraging all patients to purchase their own personal items for use such as a Home Blood Pressure monitor, Pulse Oximeter, and Digital Thermometer. These items are inexpensive and widely available from any pharmacy or online. They will not only be a useful addition to the home first aid kit but play a vital role in self managing healthcare issues and will enable you to report accurate readings to healthcare professionals either via our online services or during telephone consultations.

### Christmas dangers for pets

IWe all want to make sure our pets are included in the festivities in this Christmas. But, with so much going on, it can be easy to forget the dangers that may be present for our four-legged friends at this time of year. Here's our list of some of the major hazards to be mindful of during the festive season.

### Chocolate

Chocolate contains a chemical called theobromine, which can be deadly if eaten by dogs and cats. Even if chocolate treats are wrapped up, determined pets can still sniff them out and help themselves, so keep them far out of reach. Contact us as soon as possible if you suspect your pet has consumed any amount of chocolate, regardless of the type.

### Christmas cake, pudding and mince pies

Some of the key ingredients in many festive desserts are currants, raisins and sultanas. Eating even a small amount can lead to severe kidney failure in pets. Signs of issues may not be immediately apparent, so once again, contact us if your pet has eaten any amount of these foods.

### **Onions**

Onions, cooked or raw, can cause red blood cell damage leading to anaemia if ingested by our pets. This also includes leeks, garlic, shallots and any plant in the allium family. These vegetables can be found in hundreds of foods that we eat, and not just at Christmas, so be mindful of the danger they pose to pets and keep them well away.


### Nuts

Nuts are a staple festive food for many households, but they are a choking hazard and can cause gastrointestinal problems for pets. Macadamia nuts are especially problematic, as they can cause vomiting and weakness if eaten. Be sure to keep all nuts out of reach and clear up any stray shells.

### **Decorations**

Festive decorations such as tinsel, baubles and ribbons can seem like a fun plaything for animals, but, if ingested, they can cause blockages in the intestines. Glass baubles can also cause harm if swallowed or stepped on. If you know your pet is especially mischievous, limit their access to rooms that contain a tree or presents. Also keep decorative plants such as holly, ivy and mistletoe out of reach, as they can upset our pets' stomachs.


